## Colonel David Wilson Commander, 406<sup>th</sup> Army Field Support Brigade

Colonel David Wilson assumed command of the 406<sup>th</sup> Army Field Support Brigade (AFSB) June 2012. He is a native of Charleston, South Carolina. In 1991, he received his commission and Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from The Citadel, The Military College of South Carolina, in Charleston, South Carolina. He also holds a Master of Science degree in General Administration from Central Michigan University, Mount Pleasant, Michigan and a Master of Science Degree in National Resource Strategy from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. His military education includes the Field Artillery Officer Basic Course, the Ordnance Officer Transition Course, the Combined Logistics Officer Advanced Course, the Combined Arms Services Staff School, the Command and General Staff Officer Course, and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

His first assignment took him to the Republic of Korea and the 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion, 8<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Regiment, 2d Infantry Division (Mechanized) as a Fire Support Officer for the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 5<sup>th</sup> Infantry at Camp Hovey, Korea. Other assignments include the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion, 319<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery, 82<sup>nd</sup> Airborne Division as a Battery Executive Officer for the Bravo Battery; the 503<sup>rd</sup> Maintenance Company, 530<sup>th</sup> Supply & Services Battalion as the Ground Support Equipment Platoon Leader; the 364<sup>th</sup> Supply & Services Company, 264<sup>th</sup> Corps Support Battalion as the Company Executive Officer with deployment to Mogadishu, Somalia; the 503<sup>rd</sup> Maintenance Company, 264<sup>th</sup> Corps Support Battalion at Fort Bragg, North Carolina as the Automotive Armament Platoon Leader and the Shop Officer; the 264<sup>th</sup> Corps Support Battalion staff as the Support Operations Maintenance Officer.

In 1996, Colonel Wilson was assigned to the 2d Brigade, 24<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division (Mechanized) at Fort Stewart, Georgia as the Assistant Brigade S4. In 1997, he was assigned to the MATO Section of the 3d Division Material Management Center as the 1<sup>st</sup> Brigade Material Manager until assuming command of Delta Company, 703d Main Support Battalion. In 2000 he was assigned to Headquarters, US Army Training and Doctrine Command at Fort Monroe, Virginia where he served in the Joint Venture Directorate as Experimental CSS Integration Officer for the Army Light Experimentation Axis and then as Executive Officer to the Deputy Chief of Staff for Combat Developments. He reported to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas in 2002 for the Command and General Staff Officer Course and upon graduation in 2003 reported to the 1<sup>st</sup> Armored Division in Germany, and the Division Support Command where he served as DISCOM Executive Officer for 14 months while deployed to Iraq for Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Iron Saber. In 2004, he was assigned to the 1<sup>st</sup> Brigade Combat Team in Friedberg, Germany as a Battalion Executive Officer for the 501<sup>st</sup> Forward Support Battalion. In 2005 he was assigned to the 1<sup>st</sup> Armored Division Headquarters where he served as the Assistant Chief of Staff, Deputy G4. In 2006, Colonel Wilson was assigned to the US Army Human Resources Command as the Logistics Majors Assignment Officer within the Officer Personnel Management Directorate. In 2008, he was assigned to 4<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 1<sup>st</sup> Armored Division at Fort Bliss, Texas where he assumed command of the 121<sup>st</sup> Brigade Support Battalion until April 2010 when he reflagged the battalion to the 123<sup>rd</sup> Brigade Support Battalion. Following redeployment of the battalion to Fort Bliss, TX from Operation Iraqi Freedom, Colonel Wilson reported to the Office of the Chief of Staff of the Army, Senior Leadership Division, where he served as the Logistics Colonels Assignment Officer.

Colonel Wilson's awards and decorations include the Bronze Star Medal w OLC, Meritorious Service Medal with 4 OLC, Army Commendation Medal with 5 OLC, Army Achievement Medal with 5 OLC, National Defense Service Medal with 1 bronze star, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Korean Defense Service Medal, Iraqi Campaign Medal, Humanitarian Service Medal with 1 bronze star, Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal with 1 bronze star, Arms Forces Expeditionary Medal with 3 bronze stars, United Nations Somalia Medal, United Nations Haiti Medal, the Combat Action Badge, the Expert Infantryman's Badge, the Parachutist Badge, and the Air Assault Badge.
